1. Attempt a close reading of any *one* of the following passages : 20×1=20

There is a fatal imbalance between what man is and what he wishes to be. This discord is responsible for our unrest. We talk like wise men but act like lunatics. We cannot prepare for war and at the same time for a world community. We are tormented by inner uneasiness and pangs of conscience. The warring sides of our nature require to be reconciled. If we are to defeat fratricidal tendencies in us, we must break our self-will, the pride of egoism which is widespread in all sides of our life. In man there is always an urge to self-transcendence, but until it becomes absolute unselfishness, narrow loyalties and destructive rivalries will prevail. The unrest in the world is a reflection of our inner disharmony.

The people are saved not by their military leaders or industrial magnates, or by their priests and politicians, but by their saints of implacable integrity. Religion is the discipline by which we are helped to overcome the discord in our nature and integrate our personality. If we reflect on the history of religious development, we will be surprised at the amount of intellectual ingenuity, passion and zeal spent on the task of defining the Supreme to which silence or poetry would seem to be the most appropriate response. Self-righteousness breeds fanaticism. None but fools and fanatics are quite certain of their views of God. With crusaders there is no arguing.

Or,

If I have given you delight
By aught that I have done,
Let me lie quiet in that night
Which shall be yours anon :

And for the little, little, span
The dead are borne in mind,
Seek not to question other than
The books I leave behind.

— Locate and Explain.

- (a) Attempt a critical reading of Lord Byron's poetic fragment beginning with 'Roll On! Thou Deep and Dark Blue Ocean.'

- (b) Comment on Shelley's use of imagery in 'To a Skylark'.
- (c) Critically discuss the elements of sensuousness in Keats's 'To Autumn'.
5. Answer any *one* of the following questions (within 100 words) : $5 \times 1 = 5$
- (a) "Chillon! thy prison is a holy place" — Why is the prison called 'holy' by the poet?
- (b) "If winter comes, can Spring be far behind?" — Locate and explain.
- (c) "Thou wast not born for death, immortal Bird!" — Locate and explain.
6. Answer any *one* of the following questions (within 300 words) : $10 \times 1 = 10$
- (a) Assess Charles Lamb as a Romantic essayist. Answer with illustrations from Lamb's essays on your syllabus.
- (b) Trace and analyse the autobiographical elements in Charles Lamb's essay 'Christ's Hospital Five and Thirty Years Ago'.
- (c) Critically estimate Thomas De Quincey's 'Joan of Arc'.
- (d) How does De Quincey distinguish between 'Literature of Knowledge' and 'Literature of Power'? Answer with reference to his essay 'Literature'.
7. Answer any *one* of the following questions (within 100 words) : $5 \times 1 = 5$
- (a) "It was an awful spectacle certainly." — Locate and explain.
- (b) "... and the wood had entered into my soul." — Locate and explain.
- (c) "The foundation of the art having been once laid, it is pitiable to see how it slumbered without improvement for ages." — Which 'art' is referred to here? Why does the speaker feel that the 'art' is degrading?
- (d) "They are transfigured : Lady Macbeth is "unsexed" — Elucidate with reference to the context.

- (a) Comment on the appropriateness of the title *Pride and Prejudice*.
 - (b) Can Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* be called a domestic novel? Support your response with evidence from the text.
 - (c) Discuss *Kenilworth* as a historical romance.
 - (d) Critically comment on Walter Scott's art of characterization in *Kenilworth*.
